

The Works of Raoul Wallenberg

Who is Raoul Wallenberg? It is likely you do not

recognize this name, but Raoul Wallenberg was a quiet hero throughout World War II. He stepped up to the plate and made a difference when it counted. He was a Swedish hero, and he has saved an estimated one-hundred-thousand Jews through Adolf Hitler's reign. He was an outspoken man who proved his bravery in nineteen-forty, and his work showed.



Raoul Wallenberg was determined to make a

difference in 1936. He got a job in present day Israel, where he heard first hand stories from Jewish immigrants who used to live in Germany. He heard about Hitler's views, and he heard about the dehumanization of his own citizens. He heard more and more throughout the next four years, and it tortured him. He felt the need to help. In a snap, Raoul Wallenberg applied for many jobs to help. Soon, he got a job as Swedish diplomat in Budapest, Hungary. His mission: to save as many Jews as possible. In this situation, most people would recognize the problem and do nothing about it, but he was intent on making a difference in the current world of evil. That one step he took required integrity and courage. He really changed from an ordinary Swedish man to somebody stood up in World War II. \mathbf{R} aoul Wallenberg really showed his bravery when

the war was about to end. Adolf Hitler, knowing he was soon to be defeated, wanted to exterminate as many Jews as he could. Wallenberg heard about a plan to kill all the in a nearby ghetto; he had to act fast. Wallenberg talked to the officer leading the attack. He said "The war was about to end, and you and your troops would be arrested if you carry this out," and that was enough to convince the commanding officer to call off the attack. Over seventythousand Jews were living in that ghetto. If the German officer said no, he would be instantly arrested and ultimately executed. He put his life on the line to save people that he had never seen in his life, and that was brave.

R_{aoul} Wallenberg used his previous skills from

college to save many Jewish families. He opened an office right next to a Jewish ghetto. To carry out his work, he hired four-hundred undercover workers. With the workers, their business produced certificates of protection and then smuggled the certificates into Hungarian-Jewish families in nearby ghettos. These papers stated that the people in possession weren't allowed to be captured by the Nazis. The United States heard about his success and gave him extra funding for his project. With that funding, he then bought thirty-two safe houses for Jews to hide out in. By using the certificates and safe houses alone, he saved about fifty-thousand Jewish lives. He created a brilliant

Mikhail Gorbachev

In the middle of the Cold War between the Soviet Union

and the United States, it was Mikhail Gorbachev who decided to peacefully negotiate putting down our weapons. Mikhail Gorbachev, former president of the Soviet Union (the only person ever in that position), ended the Cold War peacefully. His maturity and responsibility proves there is still good in the world, but how did his actions prove this?



Mikhail Gorbachev gave up lots of power as the President of the Soviet Union. For example, his demilitarization of the Soviet Nuclear Program caused the prevention of an all out nuclear war between the United States and the USSR. He dissolved the USSR, diminishing his power down to only Russia, rather than the area around it. He also dissolved the Eastern Bloc, the Soviet controlled section of Europe following World War II. After this, he was content with with Germany joining NATO (the North Atlantic Treaty Organization). He then stepped down as president, he believed that the country was being torn apart, a Coup D'état staged by Boris Yeltsin was a major factor in this. Gorbachev didn't want a civil war, saying that "a split in society and a struggle in a country like ours, overflowing with weapons, including nuclear ones, could have left so many people dead and caused such destruction. I could not let that happen just to cling on to power. Stepping down was my victory." This shows that he did the things that he did, not for himself, rather for the greater good of the world.

Under Gorbachev's rule, World Peace greatly improved. The Cold War was ended peacefully, thanks to his peaceful, democratic negotiation. For example, after eight years of no meeting between Soviet and American leaders, a summit was held in Geneva. While there were not any war ending agreements immediately, the meeting went very well. The relationship between the US and the USSR became much better after this. Had they not met, the Cold War could have been much worse. He also indirectly caused the fall of Communism in Occupied Eastern Europe. It was under him that the Berlin Wall fell. He believed that Communism was a choice for other countries, rather than a requirement. "We are not abandoning our convictions, our philosophy or traditions, nor do we urge anyone to abandon theirs". Gorbachev's more modern, democratic ideologies led the world to a peace period, one that we have maintained poorly since.

Gorbachev is not just an important political figure in the past, but he remains an active positive figure today. He still travels around Russia and the world, solving problems in modern society. The foundation that he created focuses on solving political, social, and economic problems in today's world. He works against poverty and corruption, making for a better overall infrastructure. But how has he helped? For example, he defended the Crimean Status Refrendum, something that the Crimean population had voted in favor for. He is also a member of the Club of Madrid, a group of former world leaders who work to make democracy stronger. His ability to not only improve the world in the past, but in today's society, shows that he really cares about making our world a safe, peaceful place.




Decline in number of Soviet Missiles around the time of Gorbachev's Presidency

The Man Who Fed The World

Norman Borlaug was an agronomist who worked to feed the

growing population of Earth. He conducted his research in Mexico where he developed high yield, semi-dwarf, disease resistant wheat varieties, and he is credited with saving over a billion people from starvation. Borlaug is called "The Father of the Green Revolution," and he founded the World Food Prize Foundation. Borlaug was recognized for his work with the Nobel Prize, Presidential Medal of Freedom, and Congressional Gold Medal. Norman Borlaug is proof that there is good in the world.

Wheat Research

Norman Borlaug did good in the world because his wheat research in Mexico started the spread of new farming technologies to the developing world. Borlaug spent sixteen years in Mexico breeding wheat. To shorten the growth time, Borlaug grew a double wheat season. He bred wheat in Mexico's central highlands during the summer, and then he took the seeds north to the Yaqui Valley research station. Borlaug was trying to breed wheat that would have the best yields possible. First, he bred disease resistant wheat. Then, he bred them to be semi-dwarf varieties. Taller wheat got more sunlight, but often collapsed from the weight of the extra grain during rapid growth spurts. To prevent their collapse, Borlaug bred his wheat with a Japanese dwarf variety. The thicker, shorter stalks could support more heads of grain. By 1963, Mexico's wheat yield was six times the yield in 1944, when Borlaug began his work. The hardier, higher yielding wheat allowed Mexico to become not only self sufficient, but a exporter wheat.

World Food Prize

Norman Borlaug made sure his good work would be continued after his death when he founded the World Food Prize Foundation. The World Food Prize is awarded to individuals that have improved the quality, quantity, or availability of food in the world. Borlaug wanted a way to recognize people who fight hunger, or as he called it, "The Population Monster". Borlaug also wanted to establish role models for future generations, so that they too would work to end hunger. The foundation is still active today.

Green Revolution

Borlaug did incredibly good work. He is credited with saving a billion people from starvation through his work in South Asia and Africa. In the mid 1960s, India and Pakistan were at war. This caused minor famine and starvation in both countries. In 1965, Borlaug and his team sent 1,000 tons of seeds and began planting to research seed quality and seed germination rate. The germination rate is used to find the seed requirements for a certain number of plants in an area. They often worked in sight of artillery flashes. Borlaug's seeds had higher yields than ever recorded in South Asia. Shortly after, India and Pakistan imported 60,000 tons of seeds to grow the high yield wheat. Both countries went from importing hundreds of thousands of tons of wheat to self sufficient in nine years. In the early 1980s, environmental groups campaigned against Borlaug's planned expansion to Africa. Why didn't they wanted his seeds and technologies? Because the life saving crops were "inorganic". They caused the Rockefeller and Ford Foundations to stop their projects in Africa, and Western European countries were pressured to stop supplying them with fertilizer. Despite this, Borlaug founded the Sasakawa Africa Association to implement his methods. By 2008, over 8 million farmers in 15 African countries have been trained in Borlaug's methods.

Norman Borlaug made the world a better place. He fed his generation and inspired the next. Borlaug traveled to war zones and third world countries to feed them. He spoke out for the need for more agricultural technology and other advancements that will be needed to feed a rapidly growing population. Truly, he was a good man.


First Step For Mankind



When Neil Armstrong brought back the information from space, it helped the world become more advanced as it is to this day. This allowed for NASA to continue the studies in space and get farther in their education.




This is Neil Armstrong putting up the American flag in Space

How Adults With Autism Receive Help Once They Reach Adulthood



What happens to individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) when they become grown-ups? Do they receive help, or are they forced to figure things out on their own? Switching over to adulthood can be a very difficult step for everyone, but especially for people with this disorder. So how do they do it? Well, thanks to several organizations, none of these adults have to go through the transition alone.





For starters, the NonPareil Institute guides their students on the steps to success. They help adults after they graduate high school to become more independent and self reliant. They teach the crew members — the students that are receiving the help— beneficial skills, so they can learn to do more things by themselves. One especially cool aspect of the nonprofit is that it teaches the crew members computer and technology skills which gets them ready to become real-life employees. Some of the adults that go through the program come back to the institute and teach classes on how to use computer programs. One crew member that returned after going through the program is Alexander Theurer. The article states that, "Now an instructor, Alexander teaches other young adults on the spectrum how to use programs, such as Photoshop, in a computer lab on campus." However, others usually choose to go out and work in a professional environment to start making their own money. Through this institute your loved one could end up becoming more successful than you ever imagined.



Another organization that helps adults with ASD is Marbridge. For some adults with greater severities of autism living alone just isn't in the equation, so Marbridge offers them a lifetime home. They have three options for living, which are the villa, the ranch, and the village. They are all considered a substitute for group homes. You will need to pay \$550 to apply and see if you are able to afford your loved one living there. By having this offered to them their lives and their family members' lives will become less stressful. Even though they will be living with caregivers that doesn't mean they can't be independent. Marbridge gives them many opportunities that make them self sufficient, such as doing their own laundry, assisting each other, and having their own jobs there. One other very important thing it does for them is that it gives everyone very helpful life skills, like teaching them how to care for the world around them through things such as gardening. "It teaches us patience commitment and teamwork, and provides a sense of accomplishment" (Mark Knox). Mark Knox is an instructor at Marbridge who brought the vegetable garden to the campus. Gardening can also teach them ways of getting rid of their stress, which could be quite important for these adults, who might tend to get frustrated very easily. Overall, Marbridge gives so many opportunities to make these adults thrive, and lead more normal, responsible lives.

I also really enjoy Marbridge, since they let volunteers come and hang out with the residents. On Thursdays, they let outsiders come in and play bingo with them, and talk with them about how they are doing. The staff at Marbridge finds that having volunteers come in is very beneficial to the residents because they enjoy having many new friends to talk to. Usually when I talk to everyone they always seem extremely happy, and it just makes me feel good to be able to see what this amazing institute is doing for these adults. I always love to hear about their new stuffed animal, a new skill that they learned, and getting to see the craft they made in art class. Marbridge always has a ton of fun activities such as art classes to keep them interacting with each other, and also to try and find fun ways to educate them or teach them new skills. It's very vital to make sure that these adults are getting enough time to hang out with each other, and are able to make friends through activities they all like!





Fixing the life of a plastic knife

After cooling, the molded plastic is sent to packaging, and then to grocery stores and supermarkets across the nation. Eventually, after what can be months of waiting, the plastic is bought and used. After one use, the plastic is thrown away without a second thought. In the span of a thousand years, this piece of disposable plastic will languidly degrade or be eaten by a sea creature who will soon choke to death. The life of disposable plastic has been widely debated, yet no one had found a cost effective solution to this problem. Fortunately, one person saw this problem in the world and was determined to fix it, never giving up even in the most hopeless of times.



Over 100,000 sea creatures die each year by mistaking plastic for food. Despite this outcome, no scientist was willing devote their life to find a solution. However, one person made the commitment to find the secret to solving problem. That man is Marshall Medoff, an 81 year old amateur scientist who has found a way to extract cellulose, a plant fiber that no scientist has been able to reach before due to protection by the cell wall. Twenty five years ago, Medoff decided that he could do good in the world, saying that he was "tired of sitting back and waiting for others to do the work." Medoff secluded himself in a basement near Walden Pond, giving up his personal life to work. When contemplating the issues of plastics and other harmful waste, Medoff decided that rather than try to recklessly overcome nature as many had before him, he "worked with nature. [Medoff] used an electron accelerator, a machine that is used to strengthen materials, backwards. [he] realized that people were using chemicals and other destructive methods and tried to find a way around that." Even after many setbacks, including one time when he decided he was taking a wrong approach and restarted everything, Medoff knew what he was doing could help the world, so he continued to think. Finally, after more than 15 years of contemplation, Medoff found a way to extract plant cellulose.

After his astonishing discovery, Medoff found ways to make things that are harmful to the environment- such as corn sugar, plastic, and certain paints- eco-friendly. Medoff went from a completely normal person to someone who was trying his best to save the environment-and succeeding. Nevertheless, Medoff knew his quest for a more sustainable world was not over, and he continued to push his limits, willing to do anything to fulfill the reason why "[he is] here on this earth." Soon he had started a company to do more good in the world. Xyleco was able to produce Medoffs innovations, such as plastics, paints, and medicines, faster and in larger quantities. After earning a name for the company when Medoff appeared on CBS's "60 Minutes", the company created a website and received the publicity they needed. Still, Medoff did not let the recognition get to him. He continued to try and fix problems plaguing the earth.

Medoff still wasn't complacent, and decided he could still find a new idea. He invented a source of fuel, one that could change the world and the climate forever. He calls it a "still", but it is far from an unsatisfactory beverage. Medoff actually created a fuel that reduces emissions by 83% compared to gasoline. Gasoline emissions have risen more than 50% in the last 20 years alone. This new fuel is cheaper than switching to electric cars, and it runs off of cellulose, a resource that can always grow. This fuel-paired with bio-degrading plastics and other innovations-can launch the world itself into a environmentally friendly place.

Marshall Medoff persevered through setbacks and misleading ideas, and even gave up his private life and friends in order to make a simple plastic. Marshall Medoff kept reaching for the stars, never staying complacent with his achievements. Even when fame danced all around Medoff, and wealth beckoned him forward, he said no. No matter what temptations aroused and enticed Medoff, he persisted and never gave up.





CHILD FOOD INSECURITY RATE BY TEXAS COUNTY




This graph shows how many children per Texas county have to deal with food insecurity .


Leadership

"Many years have passed since I escaped life as a child soldier. Though I will carry that part of my life always, it no longer defines me. I am a proud Ugandan woman, wife, mother, friend, entrepreneur, counselor, survivor and child of God." — Grace, Graduate of ChildVoice's Lukome Center

Have you ever felt that some days, no matter how many blessings you count in your life, the world seems dark? Some days, no matter how hard you fight, the darkness still attacks you easily. Some days, when you feel like giving up, an angel will come down from the heaven to save you. This world is dark, evil, and dangerous, but there are still many people and organizations who show that there is goodness. One of the organizations that shows this angelic quality in humanity is ChildVoice – a nonprofit organization dedicated to restoring the voices of children silenced by war. A lot of children are growing up under the shadow of war, but ChildVoice gives these young victims a hope of brighter future and better life.

ChildVoice impacts less-fortunate children in poverty-stricken country. Their

desire is to break the cycle of abuse aimed at adolescent girls. One of the many functions of ChildVoice is to establish Girl **Empowerment Centers for young females** who have been victimized by war. Sadly, many of these young girls have children to care for themselves, and lack the education needed to care for themselves, their children, and pursue and education or career at the same time. These centers provide group therapy opportunities to help these adolescents heal psychologically from the invisible wounds caused by the loss of innocence and war. Many girls meet lifelong friends among the counselors and other females in the program, and the Groups provide support for their developing children as well. ChildVice operated out of a Center-Based Program, which means their campus features state-ofthe-art progressive education programs in

their Boarding School. This non-traditional method of teaching allows these young women who are scarred by war to rebuild their lives with a focus on relationship building, skills-acquisition, education, and empowerment. A vocational Center on the campus helps young girls transition from childhood to young adulthood by presenting them with hands-on learning experiences and training necessary to acquire skills needed to move into the job world. Comprehensive counseling services are provided throughout the girls' stays to ensure a strong mental and psychosocial foundation for the young mothers as they focus on their multifaceted lives as girls, mothers, students, and job-seekers. This holistic approach to healing allows these girls to be fed in body, mind, and spirit as they transition out of the Centers.

By operating these programs, ChildVoice also helps improve the lives of future generations. These adolescent girls didn't get to go to school; they couldn't learn anything that we learn in school; most of them couldn't even read or write. The only thing in their mind was to survive, so they would always have to be extremely careful and fight for the chance of living. ChildVoice changed the track of their lives. They don't have to fight for living anymore, they can learn just like us, and they can give their kids a better life. Even though ChildVoice can't save every single victims from the war, but it always tries its best to help as many as they can.

Every girl affected by ChildVoice has a story, and some are even brave enough to share it. Enduring the Night, a book that talks about all the courageous stories of survival by former girl soldiers, shows how their lives were completely broken but beautifully transformed. "For girls in the bush, life was somehow harder. Some days when I thought I could just die, I found that there was still more to endure the night." Grace, a survivor who was abducted and

taken as a child soldier at the age of 10, was forced to fight, maim, and kill or be killed. She was then taken as a "bride" at age 12 and became a mother shortly after. Years of torture ensued, but even after she escaped from the rebel army, her suffering did not end. Stigmatized and rejected by her community, her life become one of loneliness, poverty, isolation, anger, bitterness and hopelessness. Grace's story doesn't end there — through her faith and a new life in ChildVoice, she is thriving.

Today, there are 35 conflict zones around the world, where children are growing up in the shadow of war. Everyday for them is a nightmare, and sometimes living is harder than death. This world is filled with darkness, but good people make it brighter. ChildVoice shows us how just a little goodness can save many lives, and how just a little love can conquer the hate.

Malala Yousafzai and Her Journey to Heroism

People young and old from all over the globe have changed the world for the better. One of those people is the 22-year-old Malala Yousafzai. She continues to shape the molds of society where every boy and girl has a right to education.

Malala risks her life, freedom and family for the cause that she believes in. When the Taliban seized control of her hometown they banned girls from going to school. Rob Lamb, a teacher at Pattonville High School uses the tools from TGR EDU: Explore to open up many different possibilities to the students and parents they didn't know before. The programs all help the world be a smarter and financially better place.


Helping The Lives Of Flood Victims


Doing What's Right



Since then, elementary test and quiz scores have been raised all throughout Haiti. Frankly, Hope for Haiti has helped *more* than just education in school, but has helped food-wise, as well. Hope for Haiti set off a mission to ensure that more children would get lunch at school. Since then, the number of children receiving school lunches has risen tremendously.

In addition, the water quality has improved, thanks to Hope for Haiti. With the help of both the community and members of the organization, the amount of water being filtered and kept clean in Haiti has exceeded expectations. In 2012, approximately 55,000 gallons of water was filtered. That is nothing compared to more recent data. In 2016, a whopping 82,000 gallons of water were filtered. With the improvement of the state of the water, came improvement of health, decreasing the number of visits to the doctor because of illness.

Furthermore, in 2010, a devastating hurricane arrived at the shores of Haiti (Hurricane Matthew). As a result, many homes and buildings were destroyed. Luckily, Hope for Haiti responded within 24 hours of the hurricane and helped revive the streets of Haiti. It took nearly a year to reach full recovery. Hope for Haiti provided lots of help to rebuild: houses; churches; schools; hospitals; work buildings; etc. Yet, if it hadn't been for this organization, the whole process of recovery could have taken much longer than it did.

To conclude, the Hope for Haiti organization has been around for a considerable amount of time, and it has responded to many different disasters that have happened in the region of Haiti. This caused the relationship between the members of the Haitian community and Hope for Haiti volunteers to flourish. Together, they have realized that, in the end, we are all people and each and every one of us deserve to live in a well conditioned, safe place. Whether the situation was naturally caused or an unexpected dysfunction in the community, Hope for Haiti was always there to help, and they will continue to help Haiti grow and become the best society it can be in years to come.




The Austin Humane Society: A Local Animal Haven

Through helping stray animals, aiding communities in need, and giving lifesaving care, the Austin Humane Society has proved there is still virtue in the world.

Since 1952, the Austin Humane Society (AHS) has unleashed hope for countless amounts of strays.

Believe it or not, not many dogs and cats from the streets are obedient like the pets you may have at home. The AHS takes these animals in and gives them a spay/neuter surgery, vaccinations, training, quality food and toys, a warm bed, and loving care. The result of this is a loving companion who is ready to find their forever home. In addition to that, taking an animal off the streets and spaying/ neutering it decreases unwanted pet overpopulation. Therefore, they didn't only change that dog's life, but they may have stopped another whole litter of puppies or kittens from becoming strays. In the past year, the AHS also found over 3,000 dogs a loving new family through their adoption program. Not many people could say they have turned that many lives around in one year, but the AHS continues to impress.

In addition to their work in Austin, they've also reached out to help other communities. In 2017, they traveled to Houston to help the many strays and families affected by Hurricane Harvey. Traveling in huge trucks, they picked up hundreds of strays off the street and brought them to a rented plot near their shelter. There they took in around 250 dogs and gave bowls of food and water to each one. Can you imagine how long it must have taken to feed all of them? Nearly three months later, they were able to get every dog and cat back to their companion or with a new loving family. Another one of their out-of-Austin rescues was during Hurricane Katrina in New Orleans. Many of the animal shelters in that community were filling up and families couldn't support their pets, so the AHS took action. They brought back animals all the way from Louisiana! Both of these instances show how the AHS's desire to help everyone (or every animal) that they can, pushed them to go above and beyond the expectation of many.

The AHS's work has not only affected many animal's lives, but it has also been the deciding factor between life and death for some animals. This made all the difference for Pat Strain when her future companion came into the shelter. None more than a rack of bones and a flea-covered coat, the young stray was near the line of death. He had to be immediately rushed into surgery and, for the next few weeks, observed by volunteers under intensive care, one of which was Pat. After a series of medical treatments, he began looking better, but he still had trouble doing daily activities, such as going on walks. Even then, they refused to give up. Almost two months of care later, the dog, now named Asher, had made a complete rehabilitation. Once he passed his final vet checkup and was ready for adoption, Pat knew she never wanted to abandon Asher and decided to adopt him. Today, Asher has grown from the skeleton-of-a-dog Pat saw him enter the shelter two years ago as into a healthy and lively companion.

All in all, the Austin Humane Society has shown how they bring benevolence into the world over and over again. Between touching the life of each individual dog to reaching out to other communities, they are an organization like no other. If you aspire to change the world and touch lives, there couldn't be a better example of just that than the AHS.

In conclusion, Chris Fallows has done more than his fair share of work to save the ocean, and he will undoubtedly continue to contribute to the marine biology community.





The Good of Henry Ford

Henry Ford, the creator of affordable transportation, the starter of mass production, and the man who made life easier, did a lot of good to the world. He started by creating the Model T, to innovating a machine that allowed goods to be produced at almost 10x the original rate, to raising the minimum wage to unbelievable standards.

Born 1863 in Greenfield Township, Michigan, Henry Ford grew up on a farm. He later walked to Detroit to find a job, and there created his first gasoline engine. By 1896 he built his first horseless gasoline-power carriage called the "Quadricycle,". He then created the Ford Motor Company, and by 1903 he manufactured his first car.

Henry Ford thought that his first car wasn't reliable enough. Then around 1906 he learned about vanadium steel which was 3x as strong as regular steel. Now Henry Ford was now confident enough to put his car on the market, and from 1916 to 1927 there had been more than 15 million Model Ts sold.

Why was the Model T bought so much? The Model T was an inexpensive, reliable, and easily accessible form of

transportation. "When I'm through," he said, "about everybody will have one.". In fact, it was so affordable that 40% of households had one, at the price of \$300. A person could get from one place to another in minimal time, generating speeds up to 40-45 mph. They wouldn't have to take horse carriages or walk to where they needed. This form of transportation could take you almost anywhere, effortlessly.

organization that believes that individuals with Down syndrome are capable of amazing things. Never before was there a nonprofit that changed, inspired, and gave scholarship opportunities to adults with Down. Never before was there a charitable foundation that gives recipients the resources to thrive in higher education.

Inspired by the birth of Ruby Plachta: Ruby's Rainbow was created.

The moment Ruby was born was when Liz Plachta, the founder of Ruby's Rainbow, knew that she was going to change the world's perspective of individuals with Down syndrome. Down syndrome is a chromosomal disorder caused by an extra copy of chromosome 21. Down syndrome is a mental, intellectual, and characteristic disability that is a lifelong condition.

This disorder also delays development with language and memory. Because of this, many people with Down syndrome are looked down upon, because of their appearance—which often causes low self-esteem. Ruby's Rainbow has helped spread the awareness of the capabilities of people with Down syndrome. However, in the past, the public thought about this disability has not been as positive as it is today. The history of Down syndrome started in the late 1700s when many hospitals in the United States encouraged parents to give up their children who were considered "different" to institutions that would "remove them from society". There, they were afforded little education and healthcare. The popular and misguided belief at this time was that controlling genetics could improve the human race.

People with disabilities were considered unhealthy and defective—a burden to society. The most tragic part, though, was that people—and government—thought this was okay to believe. Former Supreme Court Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes once wrote "... better for the world ... society can prevent those who are manifestly unfit from continuing their kind." Unlike today, parents of children with Down syndrome did not see their kids as strong, determined, and competent. Eugenics, defined by Sir Francis Galton, was a belief in the United States that the disabled were a taint in their country-similar to the belief of Adolf Hitler and Nazi Germany. This ideology was the norm until the 1950s when Timothy Nugent founded the first disabled student program at the University of Illinois at Galesburg. This was the first transcendence in thought and time to spread the awareness of their capabilities.



"You know, that little voice in my head was getting louder and louder like I just wanted to show the world what she was made of. You don't really have that drive if you don't have a personal connection to someone with Down," said Liz Plachta during a personal interview. "After Ruby was born, I started digging deep into things that were out there for people with Down syndrome and what I found was a lot of stuff for the little guys: therapy, learning support assistance, and classroom inclusion—but not a lot for when they got older."

Ask yourself: "What happens to disabled individuals once they finish high school?".

Not many people know *if* they go to college.

Ruby's Rainbow gives \$1,000-\$10,000 in scholarships to adults motivated to receive a higher education. Scholarship recipients can use this funding for college tuition, education materials, and assisted/ independent living. Because of this, they are able to receive an education past high school.

This is why Ruby's Rainbow is so unique and impactful—it gives opportunities to capable adults so they can pursue their goals and dreams.


"That's why I started Ruby's Rainbow. I wanted the same opportunities for my own daughter that other people would have. I wanted the world to know that people with Down syndrome were amazing and incredibly capable of success." In addition to giving college scholarships, Ruby's Rainbow has started the 3-21 Pledge. This pledge consists of three things:

1) \$21 donation

2) A promise to be "kind and considerate" to people of all abilities

3) To spread the word to three friends.

Ruby's Rainbow also seeks to change the world's perspective of people with Down syndrome.



Many Ruby's Rainbow recipients have become successful. One remarkable of many, Mark Hublar, is a professional speaker and self advocate. He travels around the world to spread the message about treating everyone with respect and inclusion.

This organization has been successfully granting scholarships and spreading their mission for eight years. Ruby's Rainbow has changed the lives of over 220 recipients with \$643,000 in grant scholarships.

Those with Down syndrome can achieve their dreams of independence and a higher education. Ruby's Rainbow proves that there is good in the world by promoting inclusivity and providing life-changing opportunities.

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
