The Wilderness Prophet



In 1849, a young child and his family emigrated from Scotland to the United States. A bright boy, few would have imagined he would abandon a promising future and roam for years through the American wilderness - but even fewer could have imagined he would be responsible for saving America's wildlife. John Muir's future could have been many things but if he had chosen a different one, we might not be able to see our wilderness as it is today.

Through his selfless efforts to protect American nature for future generations to come, John Muir is a wonderful example of good in the world. At a time in American history in which people disregarded environmental concerns, Muir abandoned a promising career in industry to explore the great expanse of American wilderness and safeguard it for the future. In many ways, he can be considered

responsible for setting Americans on the path to our current, modern outlook on wilderness and wildlife, as well as for saving it for us to see.

Wandering Through America

But he might never have turned to nature had he not been involved in a factory accident as a young man, in which he was temporarily blinded. After recovering, Muir wished to see a world untouched by such things as man and machine, and chose to roam in solitude through America's wild territories, first undergoing a 1000 mile trek from Kentucky to Georgia and then traveling, often on foot, for a few years. This was when he first discovered Yosemite - the place that would prove to play a significant role in not only Muir's life, but also in preservation.

At a time when environmentalist sympathies were low in the country, John Muir managed to cultivate interest in many leading Americans in preserving the environment and natural wildlife. In particular, he was able to convince President Theodore Roosevelt of the importance of establishing and protecting new areas, especially in the West, which was wilder and more vulnerable to destruction.

In 1903, Muir was Roosevelt's guide to Yosemite on a three day trip which influenced the the President profoundly. During his time in office from 1901 to 1909, Roosevelt would establish five national parks, 150 national forests, 51 federal bird reserves, and four national game reserves - more than any other president in American history. By bringing such an important cause to the head of the nation and prompting him to take action, Muir was able to set a precedent and help future presidents and citizens take an interest in their natural wildlife and environment and its

protection. It can be inferred that a lot of American wildlife owes its current existence to a man who died more than a hundred years ago.

Calling for Preservation

By the late 1800s, wildlife faced much danger due to westward expansion. Even protected areas, such as Yellowstone, and later Yosemite, faced imminent destruction. Loggers dominated the west and cut down thousands of trees - many thousands of years old - effectively clearing acres of land of wildlife; poachers and hunters killed and endangered many species; sheep and other livestock were allowed to trample and graze with abandon; the area's natural resources were being quickly and recklessly depleted.

Muir's articles on wildlife, which were already immensely successful, started to call for preservation and chided politicians and the people for turning a blind eye to the blatant disregard of

conservation policies or the lack thereof. In his article "God's First Temples: How Shall We Preserve Our Forests?", for example, Muir explored the different disadvantages economic. environmental, and practical, of the logging and destruction of forests in California, and

"T have done the best T could to show forth the beauty, grandeur, and all-embracing usefulness of our wild mountain forest reservations and parks, with a view to inciting the people to come and enjoy them, and get them into their hearts, that so at length their preservation and right use might be made sure."

rebuked the government for its overlooking this problem. Many such articles created an impact and often caused change to occur. Alongside these articles, Muir never gave up writing of his experiences in nature. In fact, Muir might even have found the latter kind of paper more influential.

While his papers were widely read and did succeed in "getting [national parks] into [the people's] hearts", Muir would ultimately be known best for his tireless efforts to federally protect wildlife. Prior to 1890, Muir guided numerous popular figures through Yosemite, including Ralph Waldo Emerson and Robert Underwood Johnson, in an

effort to ensure its protection. Johnson, the editor of a popular magazine, proved to

the most helpful in protecting Yosemite. After he published many of Muir's articles, a bill protecting Yosemite was proposed in Congress, and 1890 saw Yosemite designated the second American national park. In addition to Yosemite, Muir was also instrumental in the creation of the Grand Canyon, Mount Rainier, Petrified Forest and Sequoia national parks.



Muir's Foreign Influence


However, Muir's true impact on America may not be found in the publishing of hundreds of articles, or the establishment of several national parks, but in his influence on the American people - and foreigners - to enjoy, and protect the vast wilderness which could be found in their country. After his death in 1914, the amount of annual National Park visitors has skyrocketed, and so has the number of national parks in foreign nations. While foreign wildlife was never a focus of Muir's, he brought conservation to America; he brought it to the world. He saved American wildlife, and he might have saved foreign wildlife too. How? Muir was one of the biggest preservationist of his time - meaning he believed in completely leaving wilderness alone. This was not a popular stance, as many other environmentalists of his time were conservationists - meaning they believed in protecting the wilderness, but using its resources in a limited fashion.

However, after the United States set up several national parks - many of which Muir had a hand in - many other countries followed suit in this preservationist idea. Additionally, Muir profoundly influenced many people from different countries, including Ryozo Azuma - the "John Muir of Japan" - and James Bernard Harkin - Canada's first Commissioner of National Parks. Through these environmentalists, Muir's influence spread to every corner of the globe.

Later Years

Muir's later years were frenzied. After he married in 1880, he moved to Martinez, California, where he grew moderately wealthy growing pears and grapes. Though he seemingly 'settled down', he frequently traveled and never gave up on his love of nature. During his later years, he visited six of the seven continents, authored several more books, and founded the Sierra Club in 1892, which he served as president until 1914. The Club followed Muir's vision and still exists today, protecting wildlife from harm. In the 1910s Muir and the club waged a bitter crusade against a proposed dam in Yosemite. Unfortunately unsuccessful, Muir died just a year after the project was approved in 1913. He died on December 24, 1914, at the age of 76 leaving behind several national parks, a protected west, and most importantly, a changed America.



John Muir has been called "The Wilderness Prophet", "The Father of Our National Parks", and "Citizen of the Universe", but beneath all of the grandeur and embellishment was a man who loved nature, who knew of its importance, and who believed in the future to protect it. Now, when Mother Nature is facing her gravest threats, it is up to us, the future, to save her once again. What John Muir started during his lifetime must be finished by our generation, and it is up to us to see whether we shall protect it like he did, or destroy it like others could have, and might have done.

John Muir's Legacy has not ended. He has influenced people from all over the globe to take responsibility for their actions and save the planet we share with countless other creatures - not just for us, but for them too. In a sometimes dark and hopeless world, selfless people like John Muir, who gave their lives to serve a higher cause, serve as an inspiration for a better future not only for mankind, but for the rest of the world too. He worked unfailingly hard towards informing the public of what needs to be done for the world to be tolerant and peaceful in the years after his death, and

March For Our Lives has had a huge impact on gun politics using social pressures. On March 24, 2018, the first MFOL rally happened in Washington DC. More than 1.2 million people came, with all the speakers being below the age of 21, making it the largest youth protest in the history of America. After the Parkland shooting, 69 gun control legislation passed in 20 states. More than 20 companies, including Delta and Hertz, have cut connections to the National

Rifle Association. Dick's Sporting Goods has also announced that they would stop selling assault-style rifles in their stores and would

only sell firearms to those 21 and older two months after the march. In a tweet, the sporting goods store also urged representatives to ban assault-style firearms, close the gunshow loophole, and raise the national minimum age of firearms purchases to 21. Dick's is one of the largest distributors of assault rifles along with Walmart which has followed in their footsteps. As a result, MFOL's measures have changed the world.

March For Our Lives has had a huge impact on the world. Besides the marches, there have been other forms of protest all over the world. For example, there was a national school walkout to raise awareness about issues of school safety and the impact of gun violence on the world. Students from 2,800 schools walked out with a

thinking of good people, who comes to mind? Is it teachers? Firefighters? Police officers? Often times

we neglect those who do the most for the world. One of these many underestimated professions is medicine. Doctors, surgeons, and medical researchers are burdened with restoring the health of the human race. Dr. Moben Mirza is a urological surgeon, professor, and researcher, as well as a father of three. With fourteen years of experience in the medical field, and twelve as a father, he has quite a lot to handle. With such a busy life, how does he manage to stay good at heart?



In the Operating Room

As a surgeon, Dr. Mirza saves the lives of cancer patients almost every day. He removes life-threatening tumors from the urologic tract, and that job comes with a lot of responsibility- even the tiniest of mistakes could change the outcome of the procedure drastically. Be it a tiny incision in the wrong place, or the wrong dose of anesthesia. Dr. Mirza has to deal with a lot of pressure having at least two major surgeries & several minor ones scheduled every Monday and Thursday. With the first one starting at 7:30 am and the last one ending at 5 pm, Dr. Mirza spends the better part of the day in the operating room, scalpel in hand. He believes that, "A doctor's only interest should be their patient's care."

Mr. Professor

When his hands aren't full of surgical tools, Dr. Mirza works as the Associate Professor of Urology at the University of Kansas Medical Center. He is igniting a spark of inspiration in the generations of doctors to come by training the young, eager med students. Being chief educator, it's Dr. Mirza's job to make sure that all residents are getting the proper education and experience, so that they're prepared for the reality of the position. His work as a professor provides students with a chance they may not have otherwise had- he's a role model to not only them but to the children that will come after.

Microscopes and Latex Gloves

There is more to Dr. Mirza's job than just teaching and operating- he also conducts clinical research. His experiments focus mainly on prostate cancer, but include kidney and bladder cancer as well. His work applies the lab data to patients, seeing how it translates into the patient care setting, and making improvements where they are needed. Dr. Mirza's handson experience provides crucial information used in finding new treatments and procedures though he doesn't spend much time in the laboratory.

"I try to make the world a better place by treating patients who are sick, by helping them live better and healthier lives." To sum it up, Dr. Mirza's impact on the world is nothing but positive. He somehow manages to save lives, make advancements in medical

research, teach a new wave of residents, and give his family the love they deserve. People such as Dr. Mirza are often forgotten, though they are



the ones doing some of the most important work for mankind. Humanity as a people should be thanking them for their determination and resilience, for where would this world be without them?

"I also do research to help advance in science. Science that can help find cures for cancer- kidney cancer, prostate cancer, bladder cancer. Find the next generation treatments and collaborate to make communities, and you know, nations, the world, a safer and better place," he says.



Fundraisers







This meant prices for food crashed. Farmers went broke because they would not be able to make a profit. completely optional. Nothing was forced upon farmers! Roosevelt also created the Farm Security Administration, or the FSA. The FSA loaned money to tenant farmers, people that rent land to farm on, at low interest rates. The FSA also set up camps in California for migrant workers and farmers in the Midwest that had gone to California in search of land/work. The FSA helped migrant farmers that had fled the dust bowl to find shelter. The loans it gave out to





The Discovery of Air-Ink


Sharma was walking out of a conference in India when he noticed black smoke emitting from some pipes. He walked closer and started to spot black particles appearing on his white shirt. After pondering why this happened and testing some theories, Sharma concluded that air pollution can be transferred into black ink. Capturing this pollution is not an easy feat, but after some trial runs of KAALINK, pollution is becoming easier to collect. KAALINK is used to catch specific matter that is emitted from direct sources of pollution. After being gathered, the pollution undergoes different processes to ensure safety of the final product. In the final stage, the now-carbon is taken into other processes to create other types of inks/paints.

Inspiring Others

This ink inspires others to face pollution and create new ideas to help the world. Sharma has explained that he also collaborates with artists and printing companies "to make carbon-negative prints with a high degree of 'carbon impact' on the environment". In fact, in New Delhi and Mumbai there are a total of four handmade OOH Posters of Shahrukh Khan that say "Painted with Pollution". Not only does Graviky labs print and paint, they also do body art, sketching, and clothing printing. Tiger Beer also teamed up with Graviky to develop KAALINK and promote it using their delivery trucks. In total, Sharma has worked with 28 artists, 5 inventors, an agency, and clients across 10 countries and 8 time zones.

Saving the Environment

Air-Ink is also very conservative. Many people ask if there is any other way to get rid of air pollution; in fact, many think that burying it will work. Pollution has carcinogenic properties, meaning it has the ability to cause cancer. If we leave this pollution unattended, it will float into the respiratory system and cause harm. The pollution that is buried or burned can turn into other types of harmful pollution, so Graviky has created a way to alter this pollution to make ink. Soot is the main result of burning fossil fuels, and this exposure can cause about 20,000 premature deaths per year! Sharma's goal is to use the pollution to replace the carbon black that would have been used to make ink and prevent people from further damage.

In conclusion, Anirudh Sharma has shown people that if you look hard enough, you can see the positivity surrounding us. Graviky Labs also exhibits the very idea that anyone can help the world. No matter who you are, you can be an influencer. Just one step at a time.

Women's Rights

Bobby Riggs was a well-known tennis Billie to a match. This game of tennis was publicized as the "Battle of the Sexes." It was the most viewed tennis match ever to be played to this day. King not only beat Riggs but beat Riggs by almost double his score. She is the reason the Women's Tennis Association was created.

Equal pay

Billie Jean King was also the first female athlete to make more than \$1000 for each game played, setting the standard for women's pay in sports. She believed that if a person .does the same amount of work, then they should get paid the same amount of money. She soon announced the slogan *"Equal play, equal pay."* Today, in the game of tennis women are paid as much as men, maybe even more.

Changing Perspective





The Federal Housing Administration encouraged more loans to buy houses and insured those loans so that people with low incomes could easily become stable again. It also extended the time for housing loans from 5-10 years to 20-30. The Federal Emergency Relief Administration helped provide funds for clothing, food, and work for those affected by the Great Depression.

Franklin Roosevelt created programs to give people jobs when they were unemployed. Many of the programs he made under the New Deal were created specifically for giving jobs to the unemployed while at the same time improving our country. A great example is the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). The CCC was created for the purpose of providing work in the natural environment. It was very successful and employed millions of jobless Americans by creating state and national parks like Big Bend and Yellowstone. The CCC also created wildlife refuges, fish-rearing facilities, water storage basins, and animal shelters that we enjoy and use today. The Civil Works Association was a government funded way of giving people work and in its first 2 months, had over 4 million people employed. The worker's achievements included 44,000 miles of new roads, 1,000 new or renovated airports, and 2,000 miles of levees. Franklin Roosevelt re-stabilized the U.S. economy and helped millions of Americans rise out of poverty. In the depths of the greatest financial meltdown in our history, he stepped up to solve the problem. His decisions reflected his care for his country and were made for the purpose of helping his people rise out of confusion, chaos, and homelessness. His actions over his 8 years as President stabilized the country and restored peoples trust in the Federal Government.

Special Recipe! Fairhaven Fish Chowder

One of Franklin Roosevelt's favorite dishes was fish chowder. Here is a recipe on how to make it:

Ingredients:

3lbs. fish (cod, haddock, hake, halibut)

1 quart diced potatoes

1/4 teaspoon ground cloves (optional)

1 tablespoon thyme

1 tablespoon marjoram

1 bay leaf

2 cloves garlic (optional)

1 or 2 onions, chopped (optional)

1/2 lb lean salt pork, diced

1/2 cups canned diced tomatoes

1 tablespoon sage

Directions:

1.) In a stockpot or large soup pot, simmer the fish in salted water and cool. Remove skin and bones (if any). Save cooking water and set fish aside.

2.) Boil potatoes which have been peeled and diced into 1/2 inch cubes in the same water that was used for cooking the fish. Watch potatoes carefully and do not overcook or they will become mushy.

3.) Grind or chop the pork using a meat grinder or cleaver (or have the butcher do it). Or, alternatively, slice into 1/4 inch dice using a sharp knife. Sauté pork in a skillet until golden. 4.) Grind or chop onions, garlic and add to pot, continuing to cook for several minutes but do not allow to brown. Add this mixture to potatoes in the stockpot.

5.) Add canned tomatoes (or an equal amount of red-ripe fresh tomatoes may be used - skins removed). Boil 2 minutes, then add the flaked fish. Boil for another 3-4 minutes, and season to taste with salt, pepper, and paprika.

6.) Crumble 5 soda crackers and sprinkle over the chowder just before serving along with a pinch of paprika and/or fresh parsley flakes.

7.) Keep covered with a little water so that it will not boil away. A few slices of lemon may be added.


Curing the World of Evil Emotions

World War Two has just ended. You realize how much war has changed you, and how much it has changed the world around you. How could life get any worse? You have never seen him before, but nevertheless, he sits down next to you, smiling as if you were his old friend. He talks about random things, and he doesn't judge you for crying. He talks about the weather, his family, and his job. He talks about how lucky you and him were, surviving the war and all that. You don't know him, but talking to him makes you feel *happy*. That man would be Viktor Frankl.

Saving Jews From Unspeakable Horrors

Being a Jew in Europe was dangerous during World War II. Being a *sick* Jew meant that you were as good as dead. As a Jew himself, Viktor Frankl decided that he would not let a hundred thousand Jews die simply because they weren't considered healthy. Before the war, Frankl worked as a doctor. Once the war started, the Nazis began to round up any Jews who were "unhealthy and unfit". Frankl began to falsely diagnose many Jewish patients to save them from the gas chambers. Because of his efforts, Frankl was able to keep over 100 Jews from dying. Eventually, he was deported along with his family and the rest of the Jewish doctors. During his time in the concentration camps, Frankl was known as an unofficial therapist. He helped many people get through the daily head counts and the hard labor. Frankl would often sit down with other inmates and talk to them about things unrelated to war, so he could get their mind off of the harsh horrors surrounding them. The Holocaust was a very dark time for many people, and Frankl was the light that helped them find a way to continue living.





Inventing Logotherapy

Not only did Frankl save many from the horrifying gas chambers, he also greatly influenced the world by inventing logotherapy, which is the concept that suffering is meaningful to life. Logotherapy is derived from Frankl's observations of humankind. It taught therapists how to distract the patient's mind with happier thoughts, without parting from the harsh truth. Logotherapy helped many patients understand that their lives were meaningful even though they might be miserable. It also helped many Jews recover from war. Logotherapy encouraged many people to start over with a new life and mindset, even though they had nothing left after the war. Of course, one would expect such a extravagant idea would be met with criticism. Why? People believed that treating terrible issues with more destructive ideas would create a big, emotional mess. Even the most successful psychologists disagreed with the idea of logotherapy. Rollo May, an American psychologist, responded to Frankl's theory: "...there seem to be clear solutions to all problems, which belies the complexity of actual life. It seems that if the patient cannot find his goal, Frankl supplies him with one. This would seem to take over the patient's responsibility and diminish the patient as a person." Eventually, psychologists like May began to realize how useful logotherapy actually was. Logotherapy provided a special way to treat patients with mental illnesses too.

Helping the Less Fortunate

Frankl's interest in helping others started at a very young age. When he was a student, Frankl began to notice how much the pressures of studying and receiving good marks could affect a

student's mental health. As a result, Frankl created a program to counsel students who had cracked under pressure. The program intended to aid students suffering from depression and personal issues. He was able to stop potential suicides from happening. When the program ended, every student that had participated felt better about themselves and most had overcome their struggles. One student reported that he had "felt better about living in a family with financial problems after Frankl had introduced him to others going through the same things..." After Frankl was liberated, he worked at the Polyclinic Hospital where he helped people recover from traumatic war experiences. 

In 2006, Tarana Burke, a longtime women's activist, coined the phrase "Me Too" to raise awareness of sexual assault in society. In 2017 actress Alyssa Milano first introduced the hashtag to Twitter, asking victims to reply to the tweet with MeToo. This created a place for victims to share their stories. Many women have come forth with accusations of sexual harassment and assault against men in very powerful positions. This movement has done a lot for women who were afraid to speak up and tell their story.



The Truth Comes Out

The MeToo Movement has given people who have been sexually abused the courage to tell their stories. In the past few years, many powerful men have faced serious accusations of sexual harassment and more. One example of a man who was convicted is Harvey Weinstein. More than a dozen women accused him of sexually harassing, assaulting, or raping them. He was then fired and he turned himself in. 

Their actions were life risking but the right thing to do."We tend to rescue the most miserable dogs who need a lot of help," claimed Eldad Hagar. He and his team would do things differently for the sake of others, and do things that influence others to do the right thing regardless of the public. It is not a matter of result, but the determination, effort, and love put in, that really makes Hope for Paws a model to look up to and follow in their steps of doing good in the world.




His Mark on the World

Julius was so impressed by this, that he made him his adopted son, therefore making him his heir. Julius's chief lieutenant, Mark Antony, wanted to be heir. When he heard that Augustus was next in line he was furious. He refused to give Augustus his uncle's funds. Augustus and the senators that supported him eventually had to pay to get the funds from Antony.

He also gained 60-70 legions and 900 warships. He decided to discharged all of his legions except for 26. To add to his legions and warship he also had 150,000 legionaries and auxiliaries. Augustus set up two main Navy bases, one at Misenum bay of Naples and one at Ravenna along Adriatic. He also had two smaller bases in Forum Juli and in Southern France. He created the Praetorian Guard, which is an elite group that was assigned to protect the emperor. Augustus also paid his soldiers for their service. Since he paid his soldiers, they were more loyal to him and were less likely to quit. Rome expanded greatly because of Augustus. He added Egypt, Northern Spain, Alpine lands, Raetia, Noricum, Pannonia, Moesia, Galatia, Paphlagonia, and parts of Pontus. "I found


• Augustus In addition to his military achievements, Augustus also created

You see a minivan approaching fast and your heart races. You brace for impact when your car suddenly stops. By itself. Your foot is still on the accelerator. Silently, you thank the stars for your investment in Tesla.

Tesla is one of the fastest growing car manufacturers worldwide. The American startup has spread to 25 countries in just 4 years, selling over 360,000 cars. You may be thinking: So what? Well here's what: the Model S is the safest car on the market. Released in 2015, it's the most reliable electric sedan clocking in at least 265 miles on a full charge. The Model S comes with the first ever autonomous driving software. With the click of a button, the car will take over so you can sit back and relax. Finally, the Model S accelerates from 0-60 in just 2.28 seconds making it one of the quickest road-legal cars.

Before its release, people were skeptical about how well the Teslas would work. When customers got a free test drive at its launch event, all the reviews were positive. Tesla had far exceeded expectation. This startup has

Tesla has expanded in its four years, releasing three other cars: the Model X, the Model 3, and the Model Y. The Model X is the classic family car. It can seat up to seven grown men. 


